## **A message from Reverend Rebecca:**

Our well-loved and beautifully maintained Church garden is a source of delight for countless people in our parish. Even before I arrived as Vicar, I developed the habit of looking at the garden as I drove by, or walked through it on my way into town. Each season there is something growing, blossoming, budding, or waiting to burst into life. Have you noticed our magnificent magnolia tree which is currently in full bloom? Its flowers are white tinged with various shades of pink. As a family we have watched the first buds grow and marveled at how quickly the flowers have bloomed. The magnolia tree's amazing radiance will only last for a few weeks, and I know that soon, those petals will be scattering the pavement as we walk to school. Somehow knowing that its beauty is fleeting makes it all the more splendid in the present.



The magnolia tree reminds me of the opening verses from the Psalms, which says that those who mediate and take joy in the Law of the Lord 'are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield fruit in its season' (Psalm 1.1-3). In this Easter season may our faith flourish and blossom like our church magnolia tree, witnessing to God's beauty and goodness, who brings life out of death.

### **1 John 3.16-end**

<sup>16</sup>We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us—and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. <sup>17</sup>How does God’s love abide in anyone who has the world’s goods and sees a brother or sister\* in need and yet refuses help?

<sup>18</sup> Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. <sup>19</sup>And by this we will know that we are from the truth and will reassure our hearts before him <sup>20</sup>whenever our hearts condemn us; for God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything.

<sup>21</sup>Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have boldness before God; <sup>22</sup>and we receive from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commandments and do what pleases him.

<sup>23</sup> And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us. <sup>24</sup>All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. ### **John 10.11-18**

<sup>11</sup> ‘I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. <sup>12</sup>The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. <sup>13</sup>The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep.

<sup>14</sup>I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me,  
<sup>15</sup>just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay  
down my life for the sheep. <sup>16</sup>I have other sheep that do not belong  
to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice.  
So there will be one flock, one shepherd. <sup>17</sup>For this reason the  
Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up  
again. <sup>18</sup>No one takes\* it from me, but I lay it down of my own  
accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up  
again. I have received this command from my Father.'

## **Six Months In . . . (part 2) by Hugh Kidd**

*Hope in Our Hands* are dropping occasional thoughts into the Parish News that might start you talking and thinking. Earlier pieces have been on food waste and heating. Today I am attempting something on the energy we use.

In March I explained how Katherine and I are working to reduce the energy consumption of our house while still living comfortably in it. Six months ago we moved into this house having improved the insulation and ways of heating which lower the energy we need to heat the space & water.

We are also tracking our other energy use. Here some

background physics helps. Electric appliances are rated for their *power* in Watts (W) or Kilowatts (kW) - the *rate* at which they are able to work. The *amount* of energy an appliance uses over any period of time depends on this and the time they are switched on (energy used = power x time).

Energy and power are confusing concepts! It can help to relate them to something more familiar. Below are a few that I find helpful in getting a handle on energy use.

- A hard working human produces around 1 kWh of energy in a day. Working without a break for 24 hours that would be at a *rate* of 40 Watts.
- Fossil fuels are incredibly energy dense. A litre (it's not much!) holds about 10kWh of energy – think of ten humans working all day. It is able to move a car 12 miles.
- Our kettle is rated at 3 kW (power). Typically it is *on* for about 20 minutes in a 24 hour day when it uses 1 kWh of energy (3 kW x 1/3 hour = 1 kWh). If it was on all day then it would use 72 kWh (3 kW x 24 hours).
- An 8W LED light bulb on for 5 hours requires 0.040kWh (8W x 5 hours). On for a full 24 hours that would be 0.192 kWh.

Over recent decades we have largely lost touch with where energy is coming from and how we use it. We are learning a lot!
