## A message from Reverend Rebecca:



This Sunday we celebrate the Presentation of Christ, also called, 'Candlemas.' The lectionary readings are the same every year and mark the official end of the Christmas Season as we look towards Lent and the Cross. When Jesus was a just baby, his parents, Mary and Joseph, brought him to the Temple in Jerusalem to 'present' him

to the Lord. While at the temple, the young family encounter Simeon and Anna who speak words of blessing over him and praised God because of him.

In Medieval times the Presentation was used as a festival of light when candles, wax, and bees were all blessed. Wax candles were incredibly precious and were the main source of light. Clergy would either go into the fields to bless the hives or sometimes the hives were brought into church



for blessing - to encourage and thank the bees for wax. People brought their candles (mostly tallow) from home to be blessed. The natural Christmas decorations in church - holly, ivy, and greenery were taken down and ploughed back into the fields - as a blessing on the land. The church turns to face Lent and prepares for a penitential season of reflection.

On Sunday as we remember Simeon and Anna, we will also remember our baptismal promise to 'shine as a light in the world, to the glory of God the Father.'

### Readings for 30th January 2022:

#### Malachi 3.1-5

<sup>1</sup> See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. <sup>2</sup>But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears? For he is like a

refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; <sup>3</sup>he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the Lord in righteousness. <sup>\*</sup> <sup>4</sup>Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the Lord as in the days of old and as in former years.

#### Luke 2.22-40

- When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord <sup>23</sup>(as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), <sup>24</sup>and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons.' Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. <sup>26</sup>It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. <sup>27</sup>Guided by the Spirit, Simeon <sup>2</sup> came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, <sup>28</sup>Simeon <sup>2</sup> took him in his arms and praised God, saying,
- <sup>29</sup> 'Master, now you are dismissing your servant\* in peace, according to your word;
- <sup>30</sup> for my eyes have seen your salvation,
- which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
- <sup>32</sup> a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.'
- <sup>33</sup> And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. <sup>34</sup>Then Simeon\* blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed <sup>35</sup>so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.' <sup>36</sup> There was also a prophet, Anna\* the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived

with her husband for seven years after her marriage, <sup>37</sup>then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. <sup>38</sup>At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child\* to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem. <sup>39</sup>When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. <sup>40</sup>The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

## Post Communion Prayer for 30th January 2022:

Lord, you fulfilled the hope of Simeon and Anna, who lived to welcome the Messiah: may we, who have received these gifts beyond words, prepare to meet Christ Jesus when he comes to bring us to eternal life; for he is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

#### January anniversaries by Margaret Ives:

In those Churches that celebrate Saints Days the life of St. John Chrysostom is celebrated on 27th January. Born in Antioch about 347 A.D. John was at one time Archbishop of Constantinople and an important figure in the early Church. He is honoured not only as a great teacher of the Christian faith through his numerous writings but also as a renowned and eloquent preacher. Hence his designation "Chrysostom" which means "Golden Mouth". One prayer attributed to him has made its way into the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England and is still used at Evensong and as part of the Litany.

January 27<sup>th</sup> is now also Holocaust Memorial Day to mark the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz by the advancing Soviet armies in 1945. It is a day when services and vigils are held in many places to remember all who perished in the Nazi concentration camps of the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century and in many other acts of genocide both before and since. There are few words spoken on such occasions. Even John Chrysostom would have been at a loss to find anything adequate to say when confronted with the evidence of such crimes against humanity.

"The tongue "according to the Letter of James "is an intractable evil, charged with deadly venom. We use it to sing the praises of our Lord and Father, and we use it to invoke curses on our fellow-men who are made in God's likeness.....My brothers, this should not be so." (James 3, 8-9). This is a salutary reminder of the power of words to promote not only good, but also horrendous evil. Hitler was a great master of rhetoric who used his anti-

Semitic speeches to spread hatred of the Jews and certain other groups and thus paved the way to Auschwitz. "My brothers, this should not be so". On this anniversary this year let us resolve once again to be careful in what we say. May we never in what we say or write ever denigrate people or stir up trouble or prejudice. May we instead have golden lips of the Gospel of love.

#### The Omicron Variant:

The Church of England has issued new guidelines for us to use to ensure that our services are as safe as practicable for all to attend. We can confirm that the steps that we have in place - sanitising on entry, wearing of masks is recommended, ventilation, the one-way system, communion in one kind, singing wearing masks - are still appropriate for the uncertain situation we now face. In line with Government guidance please do consider taking a free NHS Lateral Flow Test (LFT) if you are feeling any Covid symptoms.

Within the Church we believe that everyone is known and loved individually by God and that as many members within one body we are called to be responsible to and for one another, respecting the more vulnerable whose suffering is our suffering (1 Corinthians 12:12-27). Where we are now means we are being asked to take even more personal responsibility around coronavirus. If we all do this as a church family, we can enable as many as possible to join in worship.

Our Holy Communion services at 08.00 on Sundays and 09.15 on Thursdays allow for plenty of space for social distancing. There is no singing at these services. We hope that if you are feeling vulnerable or nervous at this time you may feel that these services would be appropriate for you.
