Gracious Father,
by the obedience of Jesus
you brought salvation to our wayward world:
draw us into harmony with your will,
that we may find all things restored in him,
our Saviour Jesus Christ.

Readings for Sunday 23rd June:

2 Corinthians 6.1-13

6As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. ²For he says, 'At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you.' See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! ³We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, ⁴but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵beatings, imprisonments, riots, labours, sleepless nights, hunger; ⁶by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, ⁷truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸in honour and dishonour, in ill repute and good repute. We

are treated as impostors, and yet are true; ⁹as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; ¹⁰as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything. ¹¹ We have spoken frankly to you Corinthians; our heart is wide open to you. ¹²There is no restriction in our affections, but only in yours. ¹³ In return—I speak as to children—open wide your hearts also.

Mark 4.35-end

³⁵ On that day, when evening had come, he said to them, 'Let us go across to the other side.' ³⁶And leaving the crowd behind, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was. Other boats were with him. ³⁷A great gale arose, and the waves beat into the boat, so that the boat was already being swamped. ³⁸But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion; and they woke him up and said to him, 'Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?' ³⁹He woke up and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, 'Peace! Be still!' Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm. ⁴⁰He said to them, 'Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?' ⁴¹And they were filled with great awe and said to one another, 'Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?'

Commemorations and Preparations:

Thursday 6th June was the 80th anniversary of the D Day landings on the beaches of Normandy in 1944.

Many months ago, Arton and I had by coincidence booked a river Seine cruise which began on that date! Arriving in Paris, we were warned about traffic jams, time delays, because 'Biden is here'. Many more VIPs were in northern France at this time and we saw cavalcades of cars with blackened windows, while all other traffic was stopped and police were blowing whistles. Chaotic! The taxi driver reminded us that the Olympics were to be held in Paris in July and pointed out the new stadiums which were still being

completed. Everywhere there were posters advertising the various events and even the Eiffel Tower displayed the 5 Olympic rings.

Our cruise sailed away from Paris after two hectic days. By Sunday we were in Rouen and on Monday we travelled by coach to the Normandy beaches. Most of the cruise passengers were from the USA and had come specifically for the visit to Omaha beach and the American cemetery. There were only 12 who chose to go to the Commonwealth war graves - 6 English, 2 Australian, 2 from New Zealand and 2 Canadians. We were fortunate in having a sensitive and knowledgeable guide, who made sure that we saw, visited and heard about, as much as possible. We stood on Juno beach, walked across Pegasus Bridge, visited museums, watched the numerous flags of the Allied armies blowing in the strong breeze - and saw many crosses; large, small, wooden, stone, concrete -many with wreaths and flowers around the base.



Late in the afternoon we drove to Ranville, a village near Caen, where we walked quietly and freely around a Commonwealth war graves cemetery. In the calm and serenity of this lesser-known cemetery, our small group stood together by the cross. Our guide quietly played a recording of the Last Post on his phone, 2 pot plants of red and white flowers were placed alongside the wreaths, and we stood in silence for a few minutes, each with private thoughts or prayers. It was an extremely moving time, probably more so because we were away from the crowds at the more well known sites.

It had been a long and emotional day, but the effect of it had been to ask, even more so than before – Why? There are still wars being fought in many parts of the world – thousands of people being killed, maimed, starving, frightened, made homeless. When will it end? When will people learn?

When peace and justice light the way the will of God is done.
When arms are changed to farming tools the fruits of life abound.
What quiet joy can bloom and grow when people work for peace,
When hands and voices join as one that hate and war may cease.
