Collect for Sunday 12th October:

Gracious God, you call us to fullness of life: deliver us from unbelief and banish our anxieties with the liberating love of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Readings for Sunday 12th October:

2 Kings 5.1-3, 7-15c

5 Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favour with his master, because by him the Lord had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. ²Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. ³She said to her mistress, 'If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy.'

7When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, 'Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me.' ⁸ But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, 'Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel.' 9So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. ¹⁰Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, 'Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean.'

¹¹But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, 'I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! ¹²Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?' He turned and went away in a rage. ¹³But his servants approached and said to him, 'Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, "Wash, and be clean"?' ¹⁴So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean. ¹⁵ Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, 'Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel; please accept a present from your servant.'

Luke 17.11-19

¹¹ On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. ¹²As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, ¹³they called out, saying, 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!' ¹⁴When he saw them, he said to them, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' And as they went, they were made clean. ¹⁵Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. ¹⁶He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. ¹⁷Then Jesus asked, 'Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? ¹⁸Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?' ¹⁹Then he said to him, 'Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well.'

ago? Can you remember celebrations to mark the 100th anniversary? Did you have older family members who were involved with St Paul's? Is there something special you could write about?


Please do help to make next year really interesting by providing us with as much information as you can.

Archbishop Designate Sarah Mullally - a personal note:

Bishop Sarah Mullally is the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Christian Aid and her introduction to its 80th Anniversary Service in Westminster Abbey included these words on faith, hope and love:

'Our faith drives us forward in the knowledge that poverty was never part of God's plan for the world and that through collective action with people of every faith and belief, we can work together for good.



Hope inspires us to ask difficult questions and seek to tackle the causes of poverty, such as the climate crisis, conflict and unfair economic systems. Hope compelled us to campaign against apartheid . . . to campaign for debt relief and to create the fair-trade movement. Hope is in our hearts when we campaign for wars to cease . . . and work with partners across social, political and cultural divides, building peace so people everywhere can restore and protect their dignity and freedom. . .

Above all our greatest motivation is love as we ... work alongside our sisters and brothers worldwide.'

That someone with this approach has been appointed as Archbishop of Canterbury is inspiring.

In Church House after the service the seating plan for the afternoon tea and awards ceremony placed me next to Bishop Sarah whose awareness of others saw her going for a new pot of tea when it was needed!

Christine and I introduced ourselves to her as coming from the parish where Rev Anderson, now Bishop of Edmonton, had been an associate priest. She apologised for 'stealing' Rebecca, our former vicar, and we then talked about Anderson's experiences of discrimination, his participation in racial justice campaigns, including speaking at a Black Lives Matter rally in Lancaster, and his being the first Dalit to become a bishop in the Church of England. It was not known then that Bishop Sarah would also become a



first, as the first woman to be elected as the Archbishop of Canterbury.

We pray for Archbishop Designate Sarah Mullally as she takes on her new role.
